Drawing parallels to a foggy, misread message at Waterloo, the sermon reminded us that the cross looked like defeat—until the full message was revealed. Jesus defeated the enemy.

The resurrection of Jesus is not just a historical claim—it is a transforming truth. Pastor Woody walked us through the scene at the empty tomb, where the message changed from "Jesus defeated" to "Jesus defeated the enemy." The angel's words—"He is not here; He has risen"—are central to the Christian faith. But what does the resurrection mean for us today?

It means that sin has been paid for, death has been conquered, and the enemy has been disarmed. It means we can live without fear, with hope, and with purpose. It means our faith is not in vain. Through Scripture and personal application, the sermon invited us to live as resurrection people—anchored in Christ's victory and sent with His mission.
